PUBLIC SAFETY

The University of Dayton, Department of Public Safety is located on the 1st floor of College Park Center at 1529 Brown Street at the west end of campus.

The Department of Public Safety is staffed by 26 sworn full-time, 8 sworn part-time, and 16 support personnel, who provide 24 hour service 365 days per year. Sworn officers are certified as Police Officers by the State of Ohio and either meet or exceed the basic training requirements of the state. All full time officers are required to hold and maintain an Emergency Medical Technician certificate or a First Responder certificate after one full year of employment at the University of Dayton. Officers are commissioned under Ohio Revised Code section 1713.50. U.D. Police have jurisdictional enforcement authority on U.D. owned or controlled properties and on public or private properties within the campus boundaries defined in the Mutual Aid Agreement with the City of Dayton Police Department. U.D. officers have the same enforcement authority as the Dayton Police Department within those defined boundaries. There is a close working relationship between the University of Dayton Department of Public Safety and the City of Dayton Police Department as well as with other federal, state and local law enforcement agencies. The department is committed to enforcement, without discrimination, of all criminal laws and statutes, as well as university regulations. It is the department's mission to provide a safe and secure environment for students, faculty, staff, and guests on campus.

CRIME PREVENTION PROGRAMS

- Actively working with Flyer media, (paper, TV & radio) on crime prevention public service announcements.
- Public Safety conducted 350 security assessments of UD owned houses in the student neighborhood.
- Public Safety presents crime prevention presentations to faculty, staff and students.
- Public Safety provides crime prevention training for first year RAs so they can train their resident students.
- Public Safety conducts security assessments of buildings and areas, and also conducts a campus lighting survey to improve security.
- Public Safety has compiled and printed “Your Rights in a Dating Relationship” brochure.
- “Operation I.D.” Public Safety will engrave personal property at no charge.
- The Bicycle Registration Program was implemented in 1994 for the purpose of providing identifying information to be used in investigations in the event of a loss. A form available on the web feeds an on-line database for immediate use by the police dispatcher, police officers and investigators. This information will assist the police in recovering stolen bicycles and prosecuting the offenders. Bicycle registration is free.
- Public Safety is currently working on a Domestic Violence cell phone drive with the phones donated to Artemis House and with neighborhood fellows to start a block watch in the student neighborhood.

CRIME PREVENTION

Crime prevention requires active, cooperative efforts between the Department of Public Safety and the university community. Personal security and the

protection of home and community are all within the scope of the department's crime prevention efforts. Preventing crime is vital to the Department of Public Safety. Make it a basic part of your life as well.

DRUGS AND ALCOHOL

The university, in compliance with the Federal Drug Free Schools and Communities Act of 1989, has established drug and alcohol programs available through Educational & Special Programs, Residential Education, the Counseling Center and Human Resources. University policy prohibits the illegal use or distribution of alcohol or drugs in or on any property owned or controlled by the university.

EMERGENCY BLUE LIGHT PHONES

Emergency Phones that direct dial the Department of Public Safety are located strategically throughout the campus and residential student neighborhood. STUDENT ESCORT SERVICE

The regular department staff is augmented by a cadre of student security cadets who provide escorts in fully

marked department vehicles. Escorts are available from 7:00 PM until 2:00 AM weekdays and from 7:00 PM until 3:00 AM on weekends. Escorts are provided from any point on campus or within the residential student neighborhood to any other point within these areas.

PHYSICAL PLANT INFORMATION

Our campus consists of approximately 159 acres and 37 buildings that support the academic effort. The university provides diverse student housing options including 7 traditional style residence halls offering double rooms and four person suites, 295 apartment units, and 347 single/duplex residential houses. All are located within the City of Dayton and are part of or immediately adjacent to the main university campus.

CITIZEN COMPLAINTS

The Department of Public Safety will investigate all allegations of misconduct by members of the department. If a concern arises regarding the conduct of a member of the Department of Public Safety, complaint forms are available from the shift supervisor. You may request to speak to the shift supervisor by calling 229-2121 and reporting your complaint to the dispatcher so that it is officially recorded. Information such as date, time and location of the service, name or description of the officer, and a full description of the dissatisfaction or inappropriate behavior will be essential for the proper investigation of the complaint. The shift supervisor will assist in completing the form and forward it to the Chief of Operations. If the complaint is against the shift supervisor you should make contact with the administrative offices on the next business day to speak with the Chief of Operations directly.

DEFINITIONS

The Clery Act regulations define a campus security authority as

- A member of a campus police department or campus security department of an institution.
- Any individual or individuals who have responsibility for campus security but who do not constitute a campus police department or a campus security department (e.g, an individual who is responsible for monitoring the entrance into institutional property).
- Any individual or organization specified in an institution's statement of campus security policy as an individual or organization to which students and employees should report criminal offenses.
- An official of an institution who has significant responsibility for student and campus activities, including, but not limited to, student housing, student discipline and campus judicial proceedings. An official is defined as any person who has the authority and the duty to take action or respond to particular issues on behalf of the institution.

TIMELY WARNINGS.

In the event a situation arises, either on or off campus that, in the judgment of the University of Dayton Chief of Police, constitutes an ongoing or continuing threat, a campus wide “timely warning” in the form of a University of Dayton Division of Student Development Safety Bulletin will be published as quickly as possible. This Safety Bulletin will be issued through the campus e-mail service addressed to each current student, faculty, and staff member. Additional paper copies of the bulletin will be distributed to all residence halls, the student union, President’s Office, Media Relations, Educational & Special Programs, Residential Services, the office of the Vice President for Student Development, and other student organizations.

PREPARATION OF DISCLOSURE OF CRIME STATISTICS

The University of Dayton Department of Public Safety prepares the Campus Safety and Security Report to comply with the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Crime Statistics Act. The full text of this report can be found on the University of Dayton Public Safety web site at <http://www.udayton.edu/~safety>. This report is prepared in cooperation with local law enforcement agencies, University of Dayton Housing and Residential Services, Health Center, Women’s Center, and the Office of Community Standards and Civility. E-mail notification of the publication of the new annual Clery Act report is sent to all faculty, staff and students no later than October 1 of each year. Additional printed copies are prepared for distribution by the Office of Admissions and are made available to the community in residence halls and the student union and also to the public at the Department of Public Safety, College Park Center first floor 1529 Brown St.

REPORTING CRIME

All violations of crime whether federal, state or local laws are to be reported to the University of Dayton Department of Public Safety dispatcher at 229-2121 or in the case of an emergency to 911. The University of Dayton does not encourage anonymous reporting of crime, however, crimes reported to Campus Security Authorities are forwarded anonymously to the Department of Public Safety for inclusion in the crime statistics for the Clery Act report. Emergency phones are distinctly marked and located in areas throughout the campus and allow for immediate reporting of incidents from their locations during an emergency situation. The emergency phones are a direct line to the police dispatcher and will summon aid with or without voice contact.

SEXUAL MISCONDUCT

The University of Dayton **Sexual Misconduct Policy** includes **Sexual Assault** (including acquaintance or date rape), **Non-Consensual Sexual Contact**, **Sexual Exploitation** and **Student to Student Sexual Harassment**. Because violations of this policy demonstrates a profound lack of respect for the dignity of each person, the University of Dayton will not tolerate sexual misconduct in any form.

REPORTING INCIDENTS OF SEXUAL MISCONDUCT

A student who is the victim of any type of sexual misconduct is encouraged to report the incident to a Resident Assistant, an Area Coordinator, a member of the Campus Ministry staff, a member of the university administration, the University of Dayton Department of Public Safety, the City of Dayton Police Department, or the Montgomery County Prosecutor’s Office of Victim-Witness Services. Students are encouraged to seek immediate psychological/medical attention from the Counseling Center, the student Health Center or from an area hospital.

When a student reports an incident of sexual misconduct to a university official, the Department of Public Safety, or other law enforcement and urgent care personnel, neither the student making the notification nor the student needing attention or assistance will be subject to the PASS disciplinary sanctions for alcohol

violations. More specific information related to sexual assault, the support program, and reporting assaults can be found in the “Sexual Misconduct Policy and Resource Guide” that is available at residence hall main desks, the Office of Educational and Special Programs, 227 Gosiger Hall, Student Government Association, the Health Center, the Counseling Center, and Campus Ministry. Reporting a sexual assault to university officials or filing a police report does not automatically initiate criminal charges. However, criminal charges may be initiated in the event law enforcement deems it necessary.

SEXUAL OFFENDER REGISTRATION

The University of Dayton, in compliance with the Wettring Act and the Campus Sex Crimes Prevention Act, has established on the Department of Public Safety web site at <http://www.udayton.edu/~safety/> information and listings provided by the State’s Attorney General’s Office concerning registered sex offenders in the university community.

ALCOHOL POLICY

It is the expectation of the university community that the climate in university residence facilities will be free from the influence of underage alcohol use and abuse. The possession and/or consumption of alcohol in Marycrest Complex, Stuart Complex, Founders Hall, Marianist Hall, Virginia W. Kettering Hall, Campus South, and sophomore Garden Apartments is strictly prohibited. The residents of a room or suite in these facilities may be held responsible for the presence of alcohol in their assigned living space. Also prohibited is the underage possession and/or consumption of alcohol anywhere on or off campus or the misrepresentation of age for the purposes of acquiring alcohol. Empty alcoholic beverage containers or packaging (cans, bottles, kegs, beer balls, cardboard cartons, etc.) are not permitted in Marycrest, Marianist, Stuart, Founders, Virginia W. Kettering, or Campus South. Alcohol abuse on the part of any student, regardless of age, associated with property destruction, violent or abusive behavior, loss of motor control, driving under the influence (OVI), or the loss of consciousness will result in disciplinary action.

DRUG POLICY

The use, transfer, possession, and/or sale of illegal drugs and the possession and/or use of any type of drug paraphernalia are prohibited at the University of Dayton. The University of Dayton considers the possession, use, trafficking of, or participation in any manner with illegal substances to be extremely serious actions and it will respond accordingly. While the university will attempt to provide support and counseling services for those with substance problems, it also will act firmly through disciplinary procedures to control drug abuse and the promotion of illegal substances on the campus and in the university community.

CAMPUS LAW ENFORCEMENT AUTHORITY

The University of Dayton Police Department is the official law enforcement agency for the university and is available **24 hours a day, seven days a week**, to serve the university community. University police officers have full arrest powers and are certified as police officers by the State of Ohio under chapter 1713.50 of the Ohio Revised Code. Police officers for the Department of Public Safety responded to over 25,000 calls for service on our campus in 2005. The department encourages the community to report all crimes against persons or property to the University of Dayton Police Dispatcher. All incidents including crimes should be reported in a timely fashion to the police department by calling 229-2121, or in the case of an emergency on campus, dial **911** from any campus phone. The use of cell phones to call 911 will connect you to the Montgomery County Emer-

gency Dispatcher or the City of Dayton dispatcher. Information on where to report crimes or obtain services is published in the student handbook and in the university rules and regulations.

Police officers for the Department of Public Safety may also issue university citations for violations of university policy, to be forwarded to the office of Community Standards and Civility, for adjudication.

In compliance with federal legislation governing the “Clery Act,” the University of Dayton Police Department provides information regarding its operation and crime statistics to prospective students, current students, and employees of the University of Dayton. The department also obtains information from the City of Dayton Police Department on suspected criminal activity involving University of Dayton students or occurring within the university area.

The department supports the university’s alcohol awareness programs as defined in the university employee and student handbooks. The department enforces all appropriate state and local alcohol laws.

PHYSICAL SECURITY

Administrative and academic buildings will be open during university business hours to faculty, staff, students, and visitors. Academic and administrative buildings will be locked after business hours, during weekends, and on holidays to prevent unauthorized entry.

Residence halls will be locked twenty four hours per day, with the exception of the main entrance, which will be open daily from 7:00 A.M. to 12:00 P.M. while school is in session to permit visitors access to the lobby areas. Wing doors leading from the lobbies will be locked twenty four hours per day while school is in session to prevent unauthorized access to residential areas. Apartment buildings will be locked twenty four hours per day. University owned houses will be locked as required by residents.

The university standard electronic access control system (WAPAC) has been installed on exterior and lobby wing doors of all traditional residence halls. The system will be installed on the exterior doors of all facilities as renovation projects are undertaken, with the exception of single unit houses and duplexes. Exterior door locking will be electronically controlled according to a pre-determined schedule. Public Safety officers will respond to open door alarms within academic and administrative buildings. Residence hall staff or Public Safety personnel will respond to open door alarms at residential facilities, per existing protocol.

Remote camera systems have been installed in common areas of academic, administrative, and residential facilities (including traditional residence halls and Lawnview Apartments). These systems record data on a server for investigative follow-up. The cameras are not actively monitored but may be monitored as situations dictate. Additional servers and cameras will be installed in conjunction with building renovations or as the result of a physical security analysis.

Physical security assessments are conducted on each facility with the goal of constantly evaluating the appropriateness of current physical security measures and implementing additional measures as required. The physical security administrator has staff cognizance over physical security systems (access control, security alarms, and remote camera systems) and coordinates the university’s security efforts.

THE GEOGRAPHY DEFINED

THE FOLLOWING IS AN EXPLANATION OF THE GEOGRAPHY FOR THE CAMPUS SAFETY AND SECURITY ACT REPORT (THE CLERY ACT 1990). ALL LOCATIONS WILL BE ASSIGNED TO A SPECIFIC SITE CODE WHICH WILL ALLOW FOR DATA RETRIEVAL TO ACCOMMODATE THE CSSA REPORT.

SITE CODE DESCRIPTION

"ON CAMPUS" this includes everything on campus proper as described to include all reasonably contiguous geographic areas.

"ON CAMPUS in Residence Halls, a subset of "on campus" crimes, which includes only those crimes that were reported to have occurred in dormitories, residence halls, apartments and houses used as residences for students located ON CAMPUS as described above to include all reasonably contiguous geographic areas.

"NON CAMPUS BUILDINGS OR PROPERTY" any building or property owned or controlled by a student organization officially recognized by the institution; and any building or property (other than a branch campus) owned or controlled by an institution of higher education that, - is used in direct support of, or in relation to, the institution's educational purposes, - is frequently used by students, and is NOT within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area of the institution. Currently this would not apply to any property involved with this institution for the purposes of the CSSA report.

"PUBLIC PROPERTY" to include all public property, including thoroughfares, streets, sidewalks, and parking facilities (not owned by this institution) and within the campus, or immediately adjacent to and accessible from the campus.

DEFINITION: The term "ON CAMPUS" for the purposes of the Campus Safety and Security Act Report includes all of the University of Dayton owned property of the main campus AND any building or property owned or controlled by the University of Dayton within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area. The SAME REASONABLY CONTIGUOUS GEOGRAPHIC AREA is described currently as the area bound by Brown Street from Irving Ave. to "L" Street, "L" Street east to the alley, the alley north to "K" Street, "K" Street west to Brown Street, Brown Street north to Stewart Street, Stewart Street east to the alley, the alley north to Chambers Street, Chambers Street to include # 9 Chambers east to 41 Chambers Street, a line north to Obell Ct. to include 213 & 215 Obell Ct., east to Alberta Street, Alberta Street south to Chambers Street, Chambers Street east to the alley, the alley south to "A" parking lot, a line along the perimeter of "A" lot to its end and then south to Stewart Street, Stewart Street east to the lane at the rear of Marycrest Hall, south on that lane and a line from it at the rear of Stuart Hall to the rear of 819 Irving Ave., a line east on Irving to include the Shroyer Park Center, across Irving to include Firwood Ave. Irving Ave., west back to Brown Street.
