## PUBLIC SAFETY

The University of Dayton, Department of Public Safety is located on the 1st floor of the College Park Center at 1529 Brown Street at the west end of campus.

The Department of Public Safety is staffed by 26 sworn full-time, 6 sworn part-time, and 16 support personnel, who provide 24 hour a day service 365 days per year. Sworn officers are certified as Police Officers by the State of Ohio and either meet or exceed the basic training requirements of the state. All full time officers are required to hold and maintain an Emergency Medical Technician certificate or a First Responder certificate, after one full year of employment at the University of Dayton. Officers are commissioned under Ohio Revised Code section 1713.50. U.D. Police have jurisdictional enforcement authority on U.D. owned or controlled properties and on public or private properties within the campus boundaries defined in the Mutual Aid Agreement with the City of Dayton Police Department. U.D. officers have the same enforcement authority as the Dayton Police Department within those defined boundaries. There is a close working relationship between the University of Dayton Department of Public Safety and the City of Dayton Police Department as well as with other federal, state and local law enforcement agencies. The department is committed to enforcement, without discrimination, of all criminal laws and statutes, as well as university regulations. It is the department's mission to provide a safe and secure environment for students, faculty, staff, and guests on campus.

## Crime Prevention Programs:

- The Patrol Lieutenant writes and submits crime prevention articles for the Women's Center News Letter.
- Public Safety has acquired a six volume video program on crime prevention issues and has provided those to the Women's Center library.
- Public Safety presents crime prevention presentations to faculty, staff and students.
- Public Safety provides crime prevention training for first year RAs so they can train their resident students.
- Public Safety conducts security assessments of buildings and areas, and also conducts a campus lighting survey to improve security.
- Public Safety has compiled and printed "Your Rights in a Dating Relationship" brochure.
- "Operation I.D." Public Safety will engrave personal property at no charge.
- The Bicycle Registration Program was implemented in 1994 for the purpose of providing identifying information to be used in investigations in the event of a loss. The on-line registration form makes information available to police officers immediately upon completion. This information will assist the police in recovering stolen bicycles and prosecuting the offenders. Bicycle registration is free.
- Public Safety is currently participating in a Domestic Violence cell phone drive with the phones going to Artemis House.

## CRIME PREVENTION

Crime prevention requires active, cooperative efforts between the Department of Public Safety and the university community. Personal security and the protection of home and community are all within the scope of the department's crime prevention efforts. Preventing crime is vital to the Department of Public Safety. Make it a basic part of your life as well.

## DRUGS AND ALCOHOL

The university, in compliance with the Federal Drug Free Schools and Communities Act of 1989, has established drug and alcohol programs available through Educational & Special Programs, Residence Education, the Counseling Center and Human Resources. University policy prohibits the illegal use or distribution of alcohol or drugs in or on any property owned or controlled by the university.

The shift supervisor will assist in completing the form and forward it to the Chief of Operations. If the complaint is against the shift supervisor you should contact the administrative offices on the next business day to report it.

## DEFINITIONS

### The Clery Act regulations define a campus security authority as

- A member of a campus police department or campus security department of an institution.
- Any individual or individuals who have responsibility for campus security but who do not constitute a campus police department or a campus security department (e.g, an individual who is responsible for monitoring the entrance into institutional property).
- Any individual or organization specified in an institution's statement of campus security policy as an individual or organization to which students and employees should report criminal offenses.
- An official of an institution who has significant responsibility for student and campus activities, including, but not limited to, student housing, student discipline and campus judicial proceedings. An official is defined as any person who has the authority and the duty to take action or respond to particular issues on behalf of the institution.

## **TIMELY WARNINGS.**

In the event a situation arises, either on or off campus, that in the judgment of the University of Dayton Chief of Police constitutes an ongoing or continuing threat, a campus wide “timely warning” in the form of a University of Dayton Division of Student Development Safety Bulletin will be published as quickly as possible. This Safety Bulletin will be issued through the campus e-mail service addressed to each current student, faculty, and staff member. Additional paper copies of the bulletin will be distributed to all residence halls, the student union, President’s Office, Media Relations, Residence Education, Residential Services, the office of the Vice President for Student Development, and other student organizations.

## **PREPARATION OF DISCLOSURE OF CRIME STATISTICS**

The University of Dayton Department of Public Safety prepares the Campus Safety and Security Report in compliance with the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Crime Statistics Act. The full text of this report can be found on the University of Dayton Public Safety web site at <http://www.udayton.edu/~safety>. This report is prepared in cooperation with local law enforcement agencies, University of Dayton Housing and Residential Services, Health Center, Women’s Center, and the Office of Community Standards and Civility. E-mail notification of the publication of the new annual Clery Act report is sent to all faculty, staff and students no later than October 1 of each year. Additional printed copies are prepared for distribution by the Office of Admissions and are made available to the community in residence halls and the student union and also to the public at the Department of Public Safety, College Park Center first floor 1529 Brown St.

## **REPORTING CRIME**

All violations of crime whether federal, state or local laws are to be reported to the University of Dayton Department of Public Safety dispatcher at 229-2121 or in the case of an emergency to 911. The University of Dayton does not encourage anonymous reporting of crime, however, crimes reported to Campus Safety Authorities are forwarded anonymously to the Department of Public Safety for inclusion in the crime statistics for the Clery Act report. Emergency phones are distinctly marked and located in areas throughout the campus and allow for immediate reporting of incidents from their locations during an emergency situation. The emergency phones are a direct line to the police dispatcher and will summon aid with or without voice contact.

## **SEXUAL MISCONDUCT**

Students reporting sexual misconduct will not be held responsible for violations of the alcohol policy but may be required to attend educational workshops.

The University of Dayton Sexual Misconduct Policy includes Sexual Assault (including acquaintance or date rape), Non-Consensual Sexual Contact, Sexual Exploitation and Student to Student Sexual Harassment. Because violation of this policy demonstrates a profound lack of respect for the dignity of each person, the University of Dayton will not tolerate sexual misconduct in any form.

A primary assertion of both our religious and civil traditions is the inviolable dignity of each person. Recognition of, and respect for the person are central to our life as a Christian and educational community and are what allow us to pursue our common mission while being many diverse persons. Thus, discrimination, harassment, or any other conduct that diminishes the worth of a person is incompatible with our fundamental commitment as a Catholic university conducted in the Marianist tradition. Every person, regardless of race, color, creed, national origin, gender, sexual orientation, age or disability shall be treated with respect and dignity. No person shall be subject to any sexual, racial, psychological, physical, verbal or other similar harassment or abuse... (Statement on Dignity, March 1999)

### **Sexual Assault**

Sexual Assault is vaginal or anal penetration by a penis, tongue, finger or object, or oral copulation without consent.

### **Non-Consensual Sexual Contact**

Non-Consensual Sexual Contact is any sexual touching, including contact with the breasts, buttocks, groin, genitals, mouth or other bodily orifice of another, or touching another with any of these body parts, without consent. Non-Consensual Sexual Contact includes disrobing or exposure without consent.

### **Sexual Exploitation**

Sexual Exploitation is taking non-consensual, unjust or abusive sexual advantage of another for the exploiter's personal advantage or benefit, or for the benefit or advantage of anyone other than the person being exploited.

### **Student to Student Sexual Harassment**

Sexual Harassment is any pattern of sexually-oriented verbal, visual or physical attention, including electronic communications, by one person upon another, which is unwanted, causes discomfort or embarrassment, and/or creates an intimidating, hostile or offensive environment.

## **SEXUAL OFFENDER REGISTRATION**

The University of Dayton, in compliance with the Wetting Act and the Campus Sex Crimes Prevention Act, has established on the Department of Public Safety web site at <http://www.udayton.edu/~safety/> information and listings provided by the State's Attorney General's Office concerning registered sex offenders that are part of this community.

## **ALCOHOL POLICY**

### **Alcohol Policy**

Alcohol is a drug, thus alcohol policy sanctions are cumulative with the drug policy for two consecutive semesters following the semester of the last documented incident. Any violation of state laws and local statutes regarding alcohol will be considered a violation of the University's alcohol policy.

### **Underage Possession and/or Use**

The University of Dayton expects all students to adhere to University regulations, Ohio State Law, and local codes concerning alcohol distribution, sale and usage. Criminal action may result in penalties of up to \$1000 in fines, six months imprisonment, and five years probation. Ohio State Law prohibits the purchase, possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages by any person under the age of 21. Ohio State Law prohibits the sale, distribution, or dispensing of alcoholic beverages to any person under the age of 21. Ohio State Law prohibits the sale or dispensing of alcoholic beverages to any person who is intoxicated or who appears to be intoxicated.

### **Alcohol Containers**

Empty alcoholic beverage containers or packaging (cans, bottles, kegs, beer balls, cardboard cartons, etc.) are not permitted in residence halls: Marycrest, Marianist, Stuart, Founders, Virginia W. Kettering, or Campus South.

### **Alcohol Abuse**

Alcohol abuse on the part of any student, regardless of age, associated with property destruction, violent or abusive behavior, loss of motor control, or the loss of consciousness will result in disciplinary action. Students who must be transported to the hospital as a result of alcohol are in violation of the alcohol abuse policy.

### **Campus Facilities and University Property**

The student use or possession of alcohol in the core campus area without specific University authorization is prohibited.

### **Distribution to Minors**

The distribution of alcohol to individuals under the age of 21 is illegal in the State of Ohio and is a violation of University regulations.

### **Common Source Distribution**

The distribution of mixed alcohol beverages from a common source other than the original packaging is prohibited. Sanctions for violating this policy may equate to the sanctions of the Keg Policy.

### **Consumption Devices**

Beer bongs or any other devices that are used to artificially increase alcohol consumption are not permitted on University property or in University facilities.

### **Disorderly Behavior (Alcohol Related)**

Engaging in conduct that is disruptive, offensive or presents a risk of physical harm to self, property, or other persons, at any time will not be tolerated and may result in University disciplinary action or criminal action.

### **Keg Policy**

University of Dayton students are prohibited from possessing beer kegs or beer devices within the University of Dayton campus area.

### **Drinking in Public/Open Container**

Persons in the City of Dayton are prohibited from drinking alcoholic beverages in "...any street, alley, park, or parking lot, or in any vehicle in or upon the same..." Note: private lawns/grass areas are not exempt from this policy.

### **Operating a Vehicle While Impaired**

No person shall operate any type of vehicle, whatsoever, while under the influence of alcohol or drugs or any combination thereof.

### **Misrepresentation of Age**

It is against the law in the state of Ohio for any person to use a falsified driver's license or any falsified identification or to misrepresent his or her age in any way for the purpose of obtaining alcoholic beverages.

### **Public Intoxication**

No person is permitted to be intoxicated in public or in public areas.

## **DRUG POLICY**

**DRUG POLICY (Note: Alcohol is a drug, thus alcohol policy sanctions are cumulative with the drug policy for two consecutive semesters following the semester of the last documented incident.)**

The use, transfer, possession, and/or sale of illegal drugs and the possession and/or use of any type of drug paraphernalia are prohibited at the University of Dayton.

### **Use/Possession of illegal drugs**

The use and/or possession of any illegal drug or the use of general products as drugs or "means to get high" is strictly prohibited for all University of Dayton students. Students documented for a possible violation of this policy and who deny responsibility for the violation will be required to submit to a drug test.

### **Sale or Transfer**

In cases of the sale or transfer of illegal drugs, severe University and/or criminal action will be taken including suspension or dismissal from the University.

### **Illegal possession or use of drug paraphernalia**

In cases of illegal possession or use of any drug paraphernalia, the paraphernalia will be confiscated and tested and the reported violator(s) may be subject to both University and criminal action.

### **Participation with drugs involving threats or weapons**

In cases of drug use, possession, or participation in any manner that involves weapons or threats of physical harm, the reported violator(s) will be subject to University suspension or dismissal in addition to criminal action.

## **Prescription Drugs**

Any use of prescription medication outside the guidelines prescribed a doctor or the use of another's prescribed medication is a direct violation of the drug policy. Any attempt to distribute or sell prescription drugs will result in immediate disciplinary action.

## **CAMPUS LAW ENFORCEMENT AUTHORITY**

The department encourages the community to report all crimes against persons or property to the University of Dayton Police Dispatcher. All incidents including crimes should be reported in a timely fashion, to the police department by calling 229-2121, or in the case of an emergency on campus, dial **911** from any campus phone. The use of cell phones to call 911 will connect the caller to the Montgomery County Emergency Dispatcher. Information on where to report crimes or obtain services is published in the student handbook and in the university rules and regulations.

Police officers for the Department of Public Safety may also issue university citations for violations of university policy, to be forwarded to the office of Community Standards and Civility for adjudication.

In compliance with federal legislation governing the "Clery Act," the University of Dayton Police Department provides information regarding its operation and crime statistics to prospective students, current students, and employees of the University of Dayton. The department also obtains information from the City of Dayton Police Department on suspected criminal activity involving University of Dayton students or occurring within the university area.

The department supports the university's alcohol awareness programs as defined in the university employee and student handbooks. The department enforces all appropriate state and local alcohol laws.

## **PHYSICAL SECURITY**

Administrative and academic buildings will be open during university business hours to faculty, staff, students, and visitors. Academic and administrative buildings will be locked after business hours, during weekends, and on holidays to prevent unauthorized entry.

Residence halls will be locked twenty four hours per day, with the exception of the main entrance, which will be open daily from 7:00 A.M. to midnight while school is in session to permit visitors access to the lobby areas. Wing doors leading from the lobbies will be locked twenty four hours per day while school is in session to prevent unauthorized access to residential areas. Apartment buildings will be locked twenty four hours per day. University owned houses will be locked as required by residents.

The university standard electronic access control system (WAPAC) has been installed on exterior and lobby wing doors of all traditional residence halls. The system will be installed on the exterior doors of all facilities as renovation projects are undertaken, with the exception of single unit houses and duplexes. Exterior door locking will be electronically controlled according to a predetermined schedule. Public Safety officers will respond to open door alarms within academic and administrative buildings. Residence hall staff or Public Safety personnel will respond to open door alarms at residential facilities, per existing protocol.

Remote camera systems have been installed in common areas of academic, administrative, and residential facilities (including traditional residence halls and Lawnview Apartments). These systems record data on a server for investigative follow-up. The cameras are not actively monitored but may be monitored as situations dictate. Additional servers and cameras will be installed in conjunction with building renovations or as the result of a physical security analysis.

Physical security assessments are conducted on each facility with the goal of constantly evaluating the appropriateness of current physical security measures and implementing additional measures as required. The Physical Security Administrator maintains staff cognizance over physical security systems (access control, security alarms, and remote camera systems) to coordinate the university's security efforts.

### **THE GEOGRAPHY DEFINED**

THE FOLLOWING IS AN EXPLANATION OF THE GEOGRAPHY FOR THE CAMPUS SAFETY AND SECURITY ACT REPORT (THE CLERY ACT 1990). ALL LOCATIONS WILL BE ASSIGNED TO A SPECIFIC SITE CODE WHICH WILL ALLOW FOR DATA RETRIEVAL TO ACCOMMODATE THE CSSA REPORT.

### **SITE CODE DESCRIPTION**

"ON CAMPUS" this includes everything on campus proper as described to include all reasonably contiguous geographic areas.

"ON CAMPUS in Residence Halls, a subset of "on campus" crimes, which includes only those crimes that were reported to have occurred in dormitories, residence halls, apartments and houses used as residences for students located ON CAMPUS as described above to include all reasonably contiguous geographic areas.

"NON CAMPUS BUILDINGS OR PROPERTY" any building or property owned or controlled by a student organization officially recognized by the institution; and any building or property (other than a branch campus) owned or controlled by an institution of higher education that, - is used in direct support of, or in relation to, the institution's educational purposes, - is frequently used by students, and is NOT within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area of the institution. Currently this would not apply to any property involved with this institution for the purposes of the CSSA report.

"PUBLIC PROPERTY" to include all public property, including thoroughfares, streets, sidewalks, and parking facilities (not owned by this institution) and within the campus, or immediately adjacent to and accessible from the campus. This will include all that is included in the "ON CAMPUS" description.

DEFINITION: "ON CAMPUS" for the purposes of the Campus Safety and Security Act Report the term ON CAMPUS includes all of the University of Dayton owned property of the main campus AND any building or property owned or controlled by the University of Dayton within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area.
